Our Vision, Our Community: Strategic Plan Update

This fall marked a significant milestone for Louisville Collegiate School as we officially launched Our Vision, Our Community, our multi-year strategic plan designed to guide the school's priorities, strengthen our community, and position Collegiate for a vibrant future. Since its introduction at the start of the academic year, the plan has already begun to take root in meaningful ways across campus.

The Board of Trustees' Strategic Plan Subcommittee has met twice since August to review progress and ensure the work remains aligned with the plan's guiding goals. During these meetings, the committee conducted a detailed review of all pillars and action items, while also inviting the administrative team members who serve as pillar owners to share updates from their respective areas. This structure allows for ongoing accountability, collaboration, and clarity as the plan moves from vision to action.

At this time, no modifications, additions, or changes to the strategic plan have been recommended. This early stability is a reflection of the thoughtful work that went into crafting the plan last year, as well as the strong alignment among faculty, staff, trustees, and leadership around its key priorities. The current focus is on implementation—ensuring that each pillar is supported with clear action steps, realistic timelines, and the engagement of those closest to the work.

Across campus, pillar owners have been meeting with faculty, staff, students, and other stakeholders to begin advancing the action items outlined in the plan. These conversations have sparked productive collaboration and have helped us take the first steps toward realizing the plan's goals—from strengthening student experience, to deepening community partnerships, to enhancing operational excellence.

A more comprehensive progress report will be shared with the community at the State of the School on January 22, 2026. This event will provide an opportunity to explore the work in greater depth and highlight early milestones. Stay tuned for additional details about the program.

As the year progresses, the Strategic Plan Subcommittee will continue its regular meeting schedule to monitor progress and ensure the work remains responsive to our community's needs. We look forward to sharing continued updates as Our Vision, Our Community comes to life—guided by the collective commitment and energy of everyone who makes Collegiate such a special place.

Fall Athletics: A Season of *Mudita*, Memories, and Milestones

Historic 2024 Fall Athletic Season for our Amazons and Titans

What an incredible fall season it has been at Collegiate. From the first whistle to the final finish line, our student-athletes have truly embodied *mudita*—the joy in others' success. The stands were packed, the cheers were loud, and the school spirit was contagious! With 73% of our Middle School students and 60% of our Upper School students competing in a fall sport, this season was a true celebration of community, growth, and pride in wearing blue and gold for the Titans and Amazons.

AMAZON CROSS COUNTRY

The Amazon runners raced to a KHSAA Region 3 1A Team Championship, led by individual regional champion **Margaret Dulaney '27**. The team, which consisted of **Mary Thomas Kute '27**, **Nora Lam '28**, **Elizabeth Dietz '30**, **Moirra Karr '29**, **Hayley Wachsman '26**, and **Alice Lam '28** took home the region title. Dulaney, Kute, N. Lam, Karr, Wachsman, and A. Lam finished 6th at the KHSAA 1A State Championships, with Dulaney earning a medal with an impressive 9th-place individual finish. Their teamwork, determination, and positivity defined their season.

TITAN CROSS COUNTRY

Dominant from start to finish, the Titans captured both the KHSAA Region 3 1A Team Title and the 2025 KHSAA 1A State Championship! **James Gurley '26** claimed his second straight individual state title, leading a powerhouse lineup that included **Everest Snyder '27**, **Hayden McIntosh '30**, **Arlo Harvey '30**, **Raphael Velinov '28**, **Ryan Wachsman '29**, and **Leo Hasselbacher '27**. Their unity, depth, and resilience made Titan history, with our first-ever boys' cross country team state title!

AMAZON FIELD HOCKEY

The Amazon Field Hockey team capped an impressive season by reaching the quarterfinals of the KHSAA State Tournament for the fourth straight year, finishing with a hard-earned 9-9-3 record. Despite battling numerous injuries, the team's

resilience shone through as players stepped into new roles and delivered key wins over North Oldham, Mercy, South Oldham, Atherton, and rival KCD, solidifying their place as a top-five team in the state. **Lillian Chung '26** earned 2025 Defensive Player of the Year honors and a spot on the Apple All Tournament Varsity Team, while **Jillian Hamilton '28** and **Abby Ridge '28** were named to the Region 3 All Tournament Team, and **Kayla Holzer '29** received Apple All Tournament JV recognition. Chung, **Claire Lococo '26**, and **Eliza Lewis '27** were named to the All State First Team, and **Laurel Jane Nelson '28**, **Rebecca Reale '27**, and Hamilton earned Second Team All State honors. From the Field Hockey Frenzy to the Champions Trace Invitational and the annual Gateway Tournament in St. Louis, the program continued to elevate its presence at both the state and regional levels.

AMAZON GOLF

The Amazons made their mark as All "A" Region Champions and went on to finish 8th at the All "A" State Tournament. The squad included: **Heidi Mitchell '27**, **Alexandra Scharfenberger '28**, **Addy Blieden '28**, **Naomi Linville '28**, and **Nessa Kaplan '28**, all whom showed remarkable consistency and composure. A special congratulations to Heidi Mitchell, who advanced all the way to the KHSAA State Championship final round!

TITAN GOLF

The Titans had an exceptional season, capturing the All "A" Region Championship and earning a third-place team finish at the All "A" State Tournament. Led by **Jacob Holzer '26**, **Taiten Luehrs '26**, **Thomas Lewis '27**, **Scott Davis '27**, and **Leo Cha '29**, the team demonstrated poise, precision, and teamwork from start to finish.

AMAZON SOCCER

Amazon Soccer capped off a solid 8–6–3 season as the Region 7 All "A" Tournament Runner-Up. Notable wins came against Presentation, Whitefield, Eastern, Fern Creek, and Butler. **Brooklyn Haraden '26**, **Hannah Rairick '27**, and **Taylor Wozniak '26** earned All "A" Region Tournament Team honors, with Haraden also named to the All District Team. This fall also marked the final season for **Coach Thomas Travis**, the program's founder, who guided the Amazons for 21 seasons and 348 games. His legacy of passion, mentorship, and family was remarkable, and we are excited for the next chapter of the Amazon Soccer program.

TITAN SOCCER

The Titans finished 18–4 as All "A" Region Champions, All "A" State Classic Champions, and 7th Region Runner-Up. Honors poured in: **Max Shelley '27**, **Thomas Weinrich '26**, **Neal Wantye '26**, and **Bennett MacGregor '26** made the All "A" Region Team; **Andrew Caborn '27**, **Max Shelley '27**, **Ashwin Muralidharan '26**, and **Noah Hayden '27** were All "A" State Tournament selections; and Weinrich earned All "A" State Classic MVP. Thomas Wienrich, **Carter Sipes '26**, and Andrew Caborn were named to the All District tournament team, and Muralidharan, Weinrich, and Wantye were selected to the All Region tournament team. Weinrich was the 7th Region Offensive Player of the Year. All 7th Region first-team selections went to Weinrich, Shelley, and Caborn; second-team selections went to MacGregor and Sipes; and Muralidharan was an honorable mention. Finally, **Caborn**, **Shelley**, and **Weinrich** were named First Team All-State, and Weinrich has been selected to play in the prestigious High School All-American Game. A legendary fall for Titan Soccer!

AMAZON VOLLEYBALL

The Amazon Volleyball program delivered a memorable 10-8 season, and created electric home match atmospheres thanks to our amazing student supporters. Big wins over Fern Creek, Waggenger, Highlands Latin, Fairdale, and Jeffersontown highlighted their grit and growth in just the second year of this program. The team was powered by an incredible 11 seniors, including standouts **Jordan Jones '26**, **Abby Mobley '26**, **Jordan Boyer '26**, **Bella Zamanian '26**, **Ava Beckley '26**, and **Izzy Nibur '26**, with rising talents **Devon Boyer '28**, **Reagan Vermost '27**, and **Nylah Fowler '30** making key contributions. Jordan Jones earned both All District and All "A" Region Team honors.

Endowment in Action: How Do You Inspire Lifelong Learning? First, you model it: Professional Development at LCS

“No tears in the writer, no tears in the reader. No surprise in the writer, no surprise in the reader.”

These declarations come from Robert Frost’s influential essay “The Figure a Poem Makes” and articulate well the importance of authenticity when we aim to communicate something truly valuable. Poets cannot expect their readers to be moved or compelled to new discoveries if the poets themselves

are not able to capture and bear out those feelings themselves when conceiving their poem. There is a responsibility of conviction that the poet needs to bring to their work if they want to communicate something important. The same is true for teaching. When a student initially falls in love with a particular subject or a new idea, it is very often after that student has been in the midst of a teacher or other adult demonstrating that kind of passion and care for a

subject. Put simply, students can absolutely tell when their teacher is still an enthusiastic learner or not.

Louisville Collegiate School is replete with lifelong learners. It is evident around campus and was apparent over the past year as our faculty took advantage of an impressive variety of professional development opportunities. The math department and several Lower School teachers traveled together to the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics Annual Conference in Kansas City last February.



World language teachers gathered at the Kentucky World Language Association last fall, and several also attended the Southern Conference on Language Teaching in Nashville, gaining new insights into the potentials and challenges posed by the proliferation of A.I. technology and into creating multi-tiered support systems to meet the differing proficiency levels within a world language class.



Our arts faculty were active this past spring as well, participating in the National Art Education Association’s National Convention, the Kentucky Music Educators Association Annual Conference, and Sing! Dance! Play! Live in St. Louis. This past September, four members of the science department traveled to the Smoky Mountains next weekend for a workshop at the Tremont Institute to explore with science teachers across the country how to use nature as a tool in the classroom. We also saw two Innovation Grants in the science



department take shape—one to realign our Lower School science curriculum with the most current Next Generation Science Standards and the second to review and refresh the Conceptual Physics course in the Upper School.

Beyond work in specific disciplines, Collegiate teachers took part in the Independent Schools Association of the Central States (ISACS) Annual Conference, the School Library Journal Summit, the Association of Independent School Admission Professionals Annual

Institute, the ISACS New Teacher Institute, and the Social Media for Schools Retreat. As Collegiate teachers have done in the summers over the past decade, two faculty members traveled to Arusha, Tanzania, to work with students and teachers at The School of St. Jude. Several faculty members also contributed to the broader education community by presenting at conferences, judging robotics competitions, and pursuing graduate and doctoral studies.

We are a community where curiosity, reflection, and growth are core values. We are a stronger school when our faculty and staff model these values. As seen above, that is happening in abundance here at LCS, and we embrace the responsibility to sustain that dedication in the months to come and the opportunities it opens up for our community.

Honoring Voices, Preserving Stories: The Women in History Oral History Project Continues

Now in its second year, the Women in History Oral History Project once again brought generations of Collegiate alumni together to celebrate the stories that define our school's enduring spirit. In October, 28 alumni spanning the classes of 1947–2016 participated in this meaningful exchange, connecting virtually and in person to share their memories, milestones, and reflections on leadership and community.

The event paired alumni from across the country with Upper School students in Dr. Alessandra Link's Women in History class, who spent weeks preparing by visiting The Filson Historical Society and researching both Collegiate's past and the backgrounds of their assigned alumni. These thoughtful interviews culminated in student presentations over lunch, where they shared what they learned about Collegiate's history and the remarkable alumni who have shaped it—from women who attended during Collegiate's all-girls era, to some of the first men to graduate, to a member of the school's 100th-year graduating class.

The morning was filled with laughter, insight, and gratitude—a vivid reminder that the strength of Collegiate lies in the stories and connections that unite us across generations.

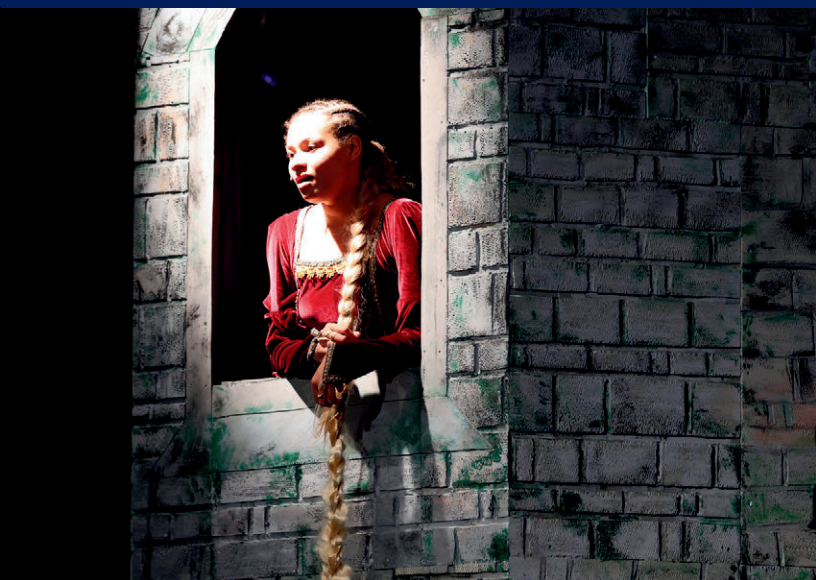

Given current tax laws, beneficiaries other than spouses may be taxed on the income, but charities such as Louisville Collegiate School are able to receive the full amount of remaining retirement assets.
