Collegiate Celebrates the Class of 2022

"Adversity strengthens the foundation." Though thousands of years old, the words of this Japanese proverb somehow seem inspired by Collegiate's class of 2022. Since the first weeks of their ninth-

grade year, teachers have described the diverse group as positive, tight-knit, and tenacious. As freshmen, they hosted legendary Secret Santa exchanges, sponsored a record-setting Pizza Bingo night, and supported their classmates in every play, game, and concert that came their way. As a faculty, we marveled at their enthusiasm. We also wondered how their desire to support one another would grow in the coming years of high school, when they would have their turn as the starring actor, starting player, or lead singer. But in their sophomore year, the global pandemic created circumstances where school

form of merit scholarship. On academic teams, the class helped set records, with the Mock Trial Team not only making it to state competition but also placing seventh overall. Not to be outdone, the Robotics Team won their region and competed



plays went unproduced, games unplayed, and concerts fell silent. While those facts would sadden many bright faces, the class of 2022 would remain undeterred.

The challenges of virtual learning, social distancing, and canceled arts and sports seasons only pushed the class of 2022 to strengthen their commitment to hope, growth, and one another. During the height of COVID, when the students were isolated almost entirely at home, the class of 2022 still found ways to connect and grow. Students wrote music, filled sketchbooks, took up endurance sports, learned to code, picked up knitting, tutored online, cared for grandparents, and worked in childcare centers so parents in essential jobs could get to work. On any given Zoom, it was a joy to ask them, "What have you been up to?" because we knew they would inspire us with their answers. In so many ways, the class of 2022 showed us that being apart physically did not have to mean being separated as friends or classmates.

When we returned to in-person learning, this group reinvested themselves deeply. Four students earned the distinction of National Merit Scholar, 19 earned AP Scholar recognition, and over 85% earned some in the World Robotics Competition, placing 44th out of 168 teams. On the sports fields, our seniors helped pilot a brand new team to the Squash National Tournament (first-ever school team from Kentucky to compete at Nationals), led the Titan Lacrosse Team to be voted Most-Improved in Kentucky, and inspired the Amazon Track Team to win their region and place fifth in state. So many of our students leading those teams also served as beacons in our arts scene, where our seniors produced, staged, and performed several theatre productions and vocal and strings concerts, despite the challenges COVID posed in doing so. As senior Emma Troost shared, "COVID created a lot of obstacles for us. In the end, those obstacles may have been one of the factors which helped to create the tight-knit community that I am so lucky to have been a part of this year." In every venue, our seniors set a standard of dedication and purpose. And while so many details of these activities had changed (students sang in the musical with masks, athletes played games without fans in the stands, and academic teams sometimes competed online), our students' care for one another and tenacious commitment to the given endeavor only strengthened.

Those strengths will follow the class of 2022 as they begin their next chapter in college. Our 68 seniors

(the largest class in Collegiate history) submitted 450 applications to 173 different colleges and universities. The members of the class of 2022 will matriculate to 50 different colleges and universities in 24 states and the District of Columbia. Five students will play intercollegiate athletics, which is particularly impressive, as they could only share details of limited playing time with recruiting coaches, and were competing for spots on teams with current

college athletes granted a fifth year of eligibility. Several students will matriculate to art and music colleges, which inspires us as we know that COVID limited their access to studios, rehearsals, and live performances. Whether studying the arts, sciences, business, language, or engineering, every member of the class of 2022 will carry with them the compassion, honor, respect, and deep sense of responsibility to their class that they formed in their years at Collegiate.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion: Partnerships Throughout the Community

We have journeyed through another school year living through lots of shifts and changes and with a sense of anticipation of refocusing on what we do best - nurturing and developing young hearts and minds. With the continued impact of the Coronavirus pandemic and social and cultural unrest in many states across the country, a primary goal this year was to continue to create a safe space for our students to fully express and embrace their individual identities in a collective environment. To accomplish this goal, we looked for additional opportunities inside and outside the classroom for students to both see themselves (mirror) and to reflect who they are (window) in our community. The use of "windows and mirrors" as an approach to support the creation of inclusive classrooms was created by the founding co-director of The National SEED Project (Seeking Educational Equity and Diversity), Emily Style, in 1988. Her seminal metaphor is still used in schools today to help educators better understand that students and teachers need to see others and themselves in the curriculum and in the classroom.

To begin the school year, I asked the faculty to critically look at the spaces where our students spend five days a week and consider how our learning spaces can reflect the cultures and traditions of our students while shining a light on all aspects of diversity. Realizing this was a process that would evolve throughout the year as teachers connected with and learned about their students, it was amazing to hear from teachers about how students seeing themselves in their classrooms improved the community within the classroom.

The faculty also helped to further the work that we've been doing to better address the question of inclusion and accessibility for all Collegiate students and families. During one of our professional development morning meetings, 10 awesome faculty facilitators joined me in conducting small group workshops that focused on several rites and rituals related to family gatherings. I asked faculty to consider who might feel unintentionally excluded from school gatherings and how we work to include everyone. During discussions, faculty considered things like transportation issues, what to wear to an event and when it started, additional financial costs beyond tuition, or whether there should be virtual options for families. They examined many ways we currently bring families together and how we might continue to look at rituals to build greater access for community



members from all backgrounds and experiences. This question is not only a Collegiate one. It is a growing question for independent schools locally and nationally – how to meaningfully build access to all community members?

Regardless of the questions we face as a school community, doing meaningful equity work is central to our mission. Our commitment to creating an inclusive community that nourishes students and families from all backgrounds and perspectives sets us apart. Below are a few highlights of ongoing initiatives from the year.

Student Affinity Group Work at LCS

Once again, Upper School students led the way in the work to provide affinity group spaces in the Upper School: GSA (Gender Sexuality Alliance), the BSU (Black Student Union), and Feminist Club. Each year, student affinity groups lead activities to highlight and celebrate cultural heritage months.

The GSA has had Pride Week celebrations annually since 2014. This year's Pride Day meeting included speakers from the Fairness Campaign, ACLU, and a panel of Upper School students and teachers. Our Pride celebration highlighted students and teachers who identify as LGBTQ+ and a message of "You Are Not Alone!" Nearly 100 faculty and staff had a picture taken holding a sign with our theme! The GSA has seen increased student involvement and now has an off-shoot club, the GSA-S, a social group for students who identify as LGBTQ+.

This year, the BSU focused on acts of service highlighting Black Americans who used their financial successes to give back to the Black

community, especially activists who have given back to support historically black colleges and universities. The BSU created a webpage to



honor local and national black business people throughout February. During February, BSU students volunteered at Gilda's Club. They also donated bake sale proceeds to Gilda's Club to support three art projects for twenty of Gilda's Club members.

The Feminist Club's presentation, during Women's History Month, included a panel of students and faculty who highlighted the importance of gender equality for a sustainable future. Panel members shared personal stories of influential women in their lives. The panel also celebrated this year's International Women's Day theme, "Break the Bias."

Although each group has a singular focus, they work together to support each other under the umbrella of The Equality Coalition.

Diversity Reading

This summer, faculty and staff, the Parents Association Board, and the Board of Trustees Diversity Steering Committee are all reading a diversity-related book. Titles were chosen based on three NAIS cultural identifiers; race, poverty, and gender identity/expression. Thematically, these titles also deal with intersectionality, isolation, assimilation, and what it means to be different, especially for school-age students. Summer reading titles are:

- George by Alex Gino
- *A Hope in the Unseen: An American Odyssey from the Inner City to the Ivy League* by Ron Suskind
- *Mindful of Race: Transforming Racism from the Inside Out* by Ruth King
- Together: The Healing Power of Human Connection in a Sometimes Lonely World by Vivek H. Murthy, M.D.

As SEED (Seeking Educational Equity and Diversity) members continue to develop/expand their cultural competence, we also examined themes of intersectionality involving the history of race in America, gender, poverty, and the study of immigrant culture. *George* and *A Hope in the Unseen* were read by the SEED group this year and *Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America* by Ibram X. Kendi and *Free Lunch* by Rex Ogle.

Partnerships Throughout the Community

Finally, none of this is possible without the help and support of faculty and parents. Thank you, Tori Sachtleben, Lower School Librarian and Sara Franks, Director of Library Services for the inaugural Diversity Read-In in the fall. It was wonderful to see such a rich diversity of book choices by students and faculty. Thank you for providing a steady supply of diverse titles in our libraries and classrooms for faculty to use with their students. It was great to once again team with Dr. Sowell to co-teach another seminal text, Invisible Man by Ralph Ellison. I also appreciate the support of Kelly Estep, Parents Association President, and the Parent Association Diversity Liaisons as we continue to discuss accessibility for all families. While I can't include everyone by name, please know that I appreciate all of the partners who work alongside me in this work every day. Thank you Collegiate Community!

Preparing for the Future, Seizing Today

"The Year of Now" was the theme chosen by Collegiate's Student Senate for 2021-2022. This declaration is entirely fitting for a group of young people who have experienced a different childhood over the past two years than they (or anyone) had expected.

Schools are poorly positioned to embrace Carpe Diem as a day-to-day guidepost. Preparation for the future is built into the very fabric of what schools are. There is, of course, the overarching awareness of the preparation for things like college, adult life, and lifelong learning, but there is also attention to the daily decisions that lead to incremental growth. Much of school is sequential and incremental; each lesson is designed to cultivate an understanding that will be built upon and used in the days to follow. Further, "living in the now" for a six-year-old rarely looks like working on handwriting skills, nor does it look like doing unit conversions in Middle School or rehearsing a scene for the fifteenth time for an upcoming play. We know these accumulated, unglamorous efforts are important parts of education, which is why "The Year of Now" both made perfect sense and offered us all a good challenge.

While we enjoyed the opportunities to get back to "normal" that this vear offered, "The Year of Now" also reminded us to embrace the moment and unique opportunities before us that we are all too aware are not guaranteed. When we got a chance to bring a parent on campus to fly drones with our IK students to teach them about cool new avenues for photography (and fun), we jumped at the chance.

We excitedly welcomed horse trainer **Brad Cox P'34** on campus to visit with the Kindergarten students before they ran in the 60th Kindergarten Derby. The full return to the senior and first-grade buddy program, after two years of restricted, abbreviated experiences, was a magical gift as well. This special relationship is one that we look forward to witnessing each year from Convocation to Commencement and, in the business of whole-child education, it is a relationship that offers invaluable moments that crystalize what we as a school are about.

The same Carpe Diem spirit went into the fourth graders going fishing with Olmstead Parks and all of the fifth-grade teachers coming together to support an amazing culminating arts celebration,"Finding Home." Weather reports looked dreadful for an excursion to Bradford Woods; the sixth grade went anyway and had a great time splashing in creeks and testing limits on the tower. We had not fielded an Academic Worldquest Team since before the pandemic, but this year, a talented group of ninth and tenth graders jumped on the opportunity to compete, won the regional competition, and traveled to Nationals in D.C. The Mock Trial seized every opportunity to practice, and it paid off with a deep run in the state tournament. The Upper School Robotics Team won State for the second year in a row and immediately made the decision to push themselves even harder than they ever had before and give it their best in Houston at the World Championships, ultimately finishing in the top 50.

None of this happens in isolation. Collegiate is a deeply interconnected place; every time we seize the day to dive into these opportunities, other teachers and students work to support each other and make these possible. Families changed work schedules, and seniors paused college applications to make time for buddies to enjoy one another. Eight-grade advisers gave up lunches and early mornings to redesign and draft new feedback methods for the ME Projects. Performing Arts Director Sharon Kinnison worked double-time to lead tech weeks for both the Middle School play and the Upper School musical at the same time so students in Mock Trial could still participate in Legally Blonde. The Robotics coaches and Chris Lerner rearranged long-published schedules in order to support students involved in both Robotics and the Strings Concert.

It's all worth it, of course. The value of education is immeasurable, but so is the unique exhilaration of being a child and celebrating the now. We work hard to honor both at Louisville Collegiate School, and this year we as a school have challenged ourselves, at the impassioned urgings of our student leaders, to be ready to seize the day. The end result was dynamic learning, energized teamwork, and magnified joy.

Collegiate Remembers Helen Kent Longley



The entire Collegiate community honors the legacy of former Collegiate faculty member **Helen Kent Longley**, who passed away in Colorado on April 5, just 12 days short of her 100th birthday.

Mrs. Longley taught history and humanities at Collegiate from 1963-1989 and is revered by generations of students. She taught everything from Ancient and Medieval History, to Modern European and American History, to current events, and chaired the History department. Mrs. Longley started the Advanced Placement program and was a valued mentor to her fellow teachers, later serving on Collegiate's Board of Trustees. Upon her retirement in 1989, the Board of Trustees established the Helen Kent Longley Chair for Distinguished Teaching, which is awarded to a faculty member at Commencement every other year. As recently as 2018, the Alumni Association celebrated her legacy by making her the first recipient of the Faculty and Staff Legacy Award.

When Collegiate announced Mrs. Longley's passing, we were overwhelmed with the response from alumni and former faculty who generously shared their remembrances for *The Bulletin* and to be shared with Mrs. Longley's family, including daughter **Gillian** Longley '69. Mrs. Longley was the most inspiring, compassionate teacher I ever had. She never showed favoritism and treated the 'A' student the same as the 'C' student. Mrs. Longley wrote my recommendation letter to Syracuse University and I credit her for my acceptance. In her wonderful way, she boosted my confidence and I will never forget her for her many kindnesses. **-Mona Tate Powell '65**

Mrs. Longley was one of a handful of impactful teachers I had at Collegiate during the 1960s. I've never forgotten her approach to studying history through examination of GERMS (Government, Economics, Religion, Military, Social). **-Beverly Lang Pierce '70**

I was saddened to see the note of Mrs. Longley's death, but I know that her legacy lives on. She taught me history and also how to think historically. And as a history teacher, I am now doing the same for my students. I teach 10th-12th graders. I teach them about GERMS and how to analyze primary source documents. The students at my school think everyone learns about GERMS, and when I explain that it's a special thing that I learned from my 10th-grade history teacher and that I continued to use all the way through my doctoral program, they are amazed. Mrs. Longley taught me to cite my sources, so I always give credit to her when I present GERMS to my 10th graders. I will feel her with me in class today. Mrs. Longley, today I'm teaching about the Crusades, and I will be using primary source documents reflecting diverse perspectives of the events. **-Minna Ziskind '88**

The Alumni Association Board is proud to share with our community the winners of our 2022 Alumni Awards and Athletic Hall of Fame Inductee. The welcome reception begins at 5:00 p.m. and dinner to follow at 6:30 p.m. The event is free and open to all alumni. Congratulations to each of these award winners!

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD - Carita Ackerly Warner '48

Carita Ackerly Warner graduated from Collegiate in 1948 and has long been an advocate for people in need, first as a student and then as a community leader.

As an Upper School student, Carita arranged an unforgettable class visit to the Central State Hospital for the Mentally III and her classmates recognized that her empathy and interest would be forever committed to that core principle of service to others. After graduating from Vassar in 1952, she studied at the Kent School of Social Work.



In 1955, she was awarded a scholarship to Vanderbilt University's Peabody

College where she earned a Master's Degree in Early Childhood Education. She returned to Louisville and began her teaching career at Highland Presbyterian Church teaching Pre-Kindergarten and then first grade at Shaffner Elementary School.

She married in 1956, started a family, and had three children. As a young mother she worked for the Louisville and Jefferson County Children's Home placing children for adoption. In 1969, she resumed full-time teaching in the Jefferson County Public Schools, where she taught Kindergarten with at risk children for 25 years until her retirement.

Carita was active in outreach programs through the Junior League, amassed a room full of tennis trophies, and helped start the Alice Gray Adult Literacy Program located at the East Broadway Goodwill Store. President George W. Bush bestowed the President's Volunteer Service Award upon Carita Warner in recognition of her outstanding volunteer contributions in community service to the United States, for her work with the Adult Literacy Program at Goodwill. Carita became President of Metro Louisville's Chapter of the Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) Association and introduced safe areas for students in the public schools.

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Carita has dedicated her life to various efforts to support her community. She is a former member of the Board of Directors of Choices, Inc. which provides permanent supportive housing for both single houseless women and their families. Carita served on the Citizens Advisory Board for Mental Health for the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Louisville. She was the 123rd President of the Monday Afternoon Club, a professional organization dedicated to the intellectual stimulation of women where members research and present their scholarly studies to one another.

As a member of the Citizen's Advisory Board of Kentucky Mental Health America, Carita raised \$10,000 to initiate funding for an endowment for the University of Louisville Depression Center. She is a Board member of the National Society of Colonial Dames and also served as a docent for the historic homes of Liberty Hall and Orlando Brown House in Frankfort, KY.

Carita lives in Louisville with her husband, Clyde Warner. She continues to play tennis and volunteers weekly as a literacy tutor. She has three children, Bill Smock (**Cathy Peak Smock '74**), Elizabeth Garvey (Matt), and Sarah Ackerly (Jay Treutel), and two grandchildren.

COLLEGIATE SERVICE AWARD - Megan Hoskins '94

Anne Megan Hoskins attended Collegiate for 13 years, graduating in 1994. Megan continued her studies at Bellarmine University, receiving a B.A. in Psychology and a B.S. in Nursing. She earned her Masters in Nursing, specializing in child and adolescent psychiatry at Indiana University–Purdue University Indianapolis in 2002. Megan has been an Advanced Practice Psychiatric Nurse at The Growth Center for Counseling and Wellness since the center opened in 2007. Megan also serves as the clinical preceptor for Bellarmine graduate students in the field of psychiatric nursing, and has been a clinical coordinator and instructor at Bellarmine.

A familiar face around campus, Megan is truly a pillar of the Collegiate community. As an involved alum and Parents Association board member, she was recruited to be on the LCS Alumni Association Board by Missy Stevens '76, and immediately made an impact with her hard work and ability to engage others.

In 2014, Megan became President of the Alumni Association and a member of the Board of Trustees. Over the ensuing eight years, the Alumni Association helped raise millions of dollars to upgrade our facilities and build new buildings. Thanks to Megan's leadership, the Association hosted the Alumni Awards free of charge, updated our definition of alumni to include anyone who attended Collegiate (removing the "Associate Alum" designation), and hosted alumni trivia nights and golf scrambles, among many other well-attended events.

This devotion and unwavering service is a modern rarity and a quiet blessing to Collegiate.



Mrs. Ogden earned accolades throughout her career, including the Helen Kent Longley Chair for Distinguished Teaching in 1992, the Ashland Oil Golden Apple Achiever Award in 1990, and she was selected for the Teacher Leaders Class for the Center for Educational Leadership from 1993-1994. She was even named an honorary alumna of Louisville Collegiate School in 1988.

Mrs. Ogden went above and beyond in many ways that have withstood the test of time. Mrs. Ogden grew the Kindergarten Derby from a small event for the Kindergarten students and their families to the beloved community-wide tradition we know today. She helped create and lead the Collegiate Summer Camp program, serving as the Camp Director of the six-week camp that offered summer employment for teachers and served as a fundraiser for financial scholarships to Collegiate. She also designed the one-week "Interim," a program which was an annual program for Kindergarten through fifth grade, offering a variety of topics utilizing the talents and interests of parents, teachers, and community leaders.

Mrs. Ogden was not only a kindergarten teacher, but she was incredibly busy outside the classroom! She served as the Coach of the JV Boys Tennis, Third Grade Basketball, and the Varsity Field Hockey goalies. She organized fundraisers to finance international travel and tours of England for the soccer team and field hockey teams. She attended almost every event and was always found snapping pictures, which were then used for *The Bulletin, Transcript,* and various school communications. She has also been incredibly involved in the community, holding several leadership positions within the Junior League of Louisville and organizing countless fundraisers for worthy causes.

There are generations of students she aimed to mold into brave, thoughtful, and compassionate individuals. To this day, she continues to support and take an active interest in how her students are doing, making sure they are the best versions of themselves.


