Social-Emotional Learning in the Upper School


Adolescence can be a challenging stage of life. Academic pressures, social media, and busy schedules are just a few of the reasons teens can feel overwhelmed and anxious. Additionally, the global pandemic and resulting stress and isolation have made navigating these years even harder for most middle and high school students, with a lingering impact that experts have yet to fully understand. Both of us have worked with high school students our entire careers, but when we stepped into our current roles in 2021, we still found ourselves regularly checking in with each other to reflect on the increasing and diverse needs of our students.

In the fall of 2021, the American Academy of Pediatrics, along with the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and the Children's Hospital Association, declared a national emergency in child and adolescent mental health. The CDC reported a 40% increase in just one decade in the number of high school students reporting feelings of sadness and hopelessness. Surgeon General Vivek Murthy issued an advisory on Protecting Youth Mental Health that detailed the current youth mental health crisis, factors impacting adolescents' well-being, and ways to bolster adolescent resilience. Among the most prominent protective factors for teens is a healthy community and attending schools that offer social-emotional learning (SEL) opportunities.

With this knowledge in mind, over the past two years, we designed and implemented our current Upper School SEL program. Its many components

together aim to help students create a strong foundation of self, relationships, and community that supports their ability to fully access their education; build resilience; and develop the tools and skills to become healthy and successful adults.

Connecting with students about their needs is an essential component of our whole-person approach to education. As we met with students to better understand their perspectives, one comment was repeatedly expressed: students wanted to be introduced to information and develop social-emotional skills as a proactive strategy rather than a reactive response. Simply put, the earlier the better. We created a comprehensive program for ninth-grade students that spreads SEL throughout their day and year. Most notably is the Wellness Foundations series. Now we have subject matter experts leading age-appropriate classes on substance use prevention, body image, healthy relationships, and mental health.

Another SEL focused program for ninth-grade students is our Compassion, Communication and Conflict Workshop offered as a collaboration between the US Counseling and the ninth-grade English teachers. Through this program, students consider how their own understanding and exploration of compassion and conflict can impact their well-being and the well-being of their community. Students

engage in conflict resolution strategies through literary inquiry and modeling.

Finally, for ninth grade, we launched our "How To Do LCS" orientation. As part of this new initiative, students engage in a culture-building activity. They reflected on creating their personal legacies at LCS and their desired culture for both their grade and the entire school. As their takeaway, they set intentional goals

related to culture and appropriate action steps, and advisors and students revisit these goals throughout the year.

Our ninth-grade SEL curriculum sets the stage for three more years of exploration and growth. Tenth-grade students meet with a trained facilitator from Prevention Solutions to learn more about substance use prevention and the positive impact of delayed use and

community partnership. They also engage in SEL Co-Edge classes: Well-being I, Community and Healthy Relationships, Ethics, and Media Literacy.

Eleventh-grade students have the opportunity to continue to develop competencies and understanding in the areas of mental health, healthy relationships, and substance use prevention through high level conversations with experts in those areas.

Seniors have SEL and applied health programs that are focused on facilitating their transition to adulthood. They become trained in QPR suicide prevention and KY Harm Reduction Fentanyl Awareness. We discuss the academic, social, and emotional transition to college and ways they can continue to prioritize their health and well-being in a new and different environment. We invite alumni to campus to share their experiences with not only career decision-making but also life choices and personal fulfillment.

This year each grade level also engaged in a class retreat at the Earth and Spirit Center. This experience helped facilitate bonding and development in the areas of compassion, leadership, nature, and community.

Faculty play a key role in this program. All faculty have been trained in QPR suicide prevention, and all Upper School faculty have been or will soon be certified in Youth Mental Health First Aid. Our faculty understand the connection between academic success

and personal well-being, and they are eager to support our students in every way possible. This training also supports our teachers with our annual health and well-being check-ins that occur between advisors and students each January.

Finally, we know family partnership is essential not only for the strength of our community, but also for the well-being of our students. Through both family

programs and relationship building, we try to offer resources and opportunities as we together seek to support our teens.

By design and necessity, this is a dynamic program. We are both proactive and responsive to what our students tell us they need and want in regards to applied health, well-being and SEL--and that is part of its strength. Our students are amazing; they are aware of the importance of taking care of their mental health, they are curious about how to live and love well, and they appreciate factual information that helps them make personal decisions aligned with their values. This is a partnership among students, families, and faculty, and we are grateful for the commitment our community has to loving and raising healthy, happy, hopeful young adults.

A special thank you to our school-wide counseling team for sharing their expertise and support: Bridget McGuire, Lower School Counselor; Kate Edelen, Middle School Counselor; and Jim McGuire, Associate Head of School. We are also grateful to Abigail O'Brien, Ninth-Grade Dean, for her partnership and leadership on "How to do LCS" and the Compassion, Communication and Conflict Workshop, and to our Lifetime Fitness and Wellness team for supporting the Wellness Foundations program: Jason Coy, Dominique Gibbons, Leighton Main, John Miller, and Chad Wozniak.

Our Amazons and Titans continue to value the importance of school athletics, which is evident in our participation rates. This fall season alone, Collegiate had 333 individual participants (63%) in grades 5-12 across 24 teams with 41 coaches. Compared to 234 participants, 17 teams, and 33 coaches in the fall of 2019, our fall sports programs have consistently grown over the past five school years.

At the varsity level, we continue to see unprecedented growth and the success that follows. Amazon Cross Country was the 1A KHSAA Region 3 Team Champion, with Mary Thomas Kute '27 placing first and Margaret Dulaney '27 taking second place in the region. At the 1A KHSAA State Meet, the Amazons were 10th, with Dulaney placing 7th and Kute running to a 12th place finish. Titan Cross Country took second place at the Regional

Championships, with **Roman Sierpina '25** placing first and **James Gurley '26** finishing fourth. Sierpina was the 1A KHSAA State Meet Runner-Up, and Gurley finished fifth for the Titans, who placed eighth in the team standings.

Amazon Field Hockey was the Region 3 runner-up and advanced to the KHSAA State Tournament Quarterfinals for the second consecutive year, falling 4-0 to eventual state champions Christian Academy. The Amazons blended senior leadership with younger talent and finished 14-11-1 for the season, including 4-2 in region play. Over the summer, Lillian Chung '26 was named to the Max Field Hockey Class of 2026 Top 100 Players to Watch. Representing the Amazons on the All-Region Tournament team were Rachel Disney '24, Rosie Miller '26, and Eliza Lewis '27.

The Titan Golf team placed second in the All "A" Regional Tournament, and Jacob Holzer '26 tied for eighth place at the All "A" State competition. Holzer also took first place in the Rocket Invitational to start the season with a 68 (-4). A young and talented Amazon golf team, led by first-year Head Coach Jason Coy, took first at the All "A" Regional Tournament. Heidi Mitchell '27 finished third in the KHSAA 6th Region Championship and advanced to the KHSAA Semi-State round! Mitchell was also named to the All-Region 6 Second Team.

Amazon Soccer advanced to the Regional Tournament for the second time ever (back-to-back

seasons) and recorded the 200th win in Amazon Soccer program history. They finished 13-5 on the season, were All "A" Region 7 and KHSAA District 26 tournament runner-ups, and ranked #17 in the KY Coaches Association Poll. **Gabbie Schulten '24** was named to the KHSAA All-Region Team for the 7th Region, and **Chloe Layfield '27** was voted the top high school girls player in the Louisville Area by the *Courier Journal*.

Titan Soccer spent most of the season ranked in the top five in the state and finished with an 18-3-2 record, falling in penalty kicks to eventual state champion St. Xavier in the Regional Championship game. The Titans did bring the All "A" State Championship trophy back to Collegiate, our eighth in school history, as they marched through the All "A" Region 7 and State Classic Tournament this fall. They finished as KHSAA District 26 and Region 7 Tournament Runner-Ups. The team was awarded the United Soccer Coaches (USC) Association Team Offense award, and Nick Harshaw '24 was named the Offensive Player of the Year and a USC All-American.

Collegiate hosted several events this fall, including Faculty and Staff Appreciation Night, Homecoming, the All "A" State Classic, District and Regional Tournaments, Movie Night at the "C," Alumni Nights, and Senior Nights at

the new Barker Brown Athletic Complex. These events allow Collegiate to start the school year with community-building events and opportunities for memories to last a lifetime. I am appreciative of all our volunteers throughout the fall, multiple faculty, staff, and administrators who covered athletic events, and especially our 41 fall season coaches (18 in the Middle School and 23 in Upper School) who poured their time, effort, and hearts into their work with our student-athletes.

Finally, athletic event managers **Derek Ferch** and **Dom Gibbons** contributed significantly in their first season, helping with home athletic events. **Patrick Lincoln**, our athletic trainer, continued to do all he could to help prevent and work through injuries with our student-athletes, and Assistant Athletic Directors **Meghan Farmer** and **Ryan Smith** consistently brought their best every day to serve our teams and students. I am incredibly proud of this fall season and look forward to more winter and spring highlights!




Support the 2023-24 Fund and Help Bridge "the Gap"
